


CHART I: Employment in agriculture, forestry & fishing sector in EU in 2019 by education level




CHART II: Employment in agriculture, forestry & fishing sector in EU in 2019 by age groups

Types of Seasonal Workers

• Coming from other Member States;

EU Seasonal Workers

They have the right to take up employment in another Member State, including seasonal work.

• Coming from third countries;

Non-EU Seasonal Workers

They usually need to apply for a visa, work permit or a residence permit to stay and work in a Member State.


